Internships

Some connections are easy to make

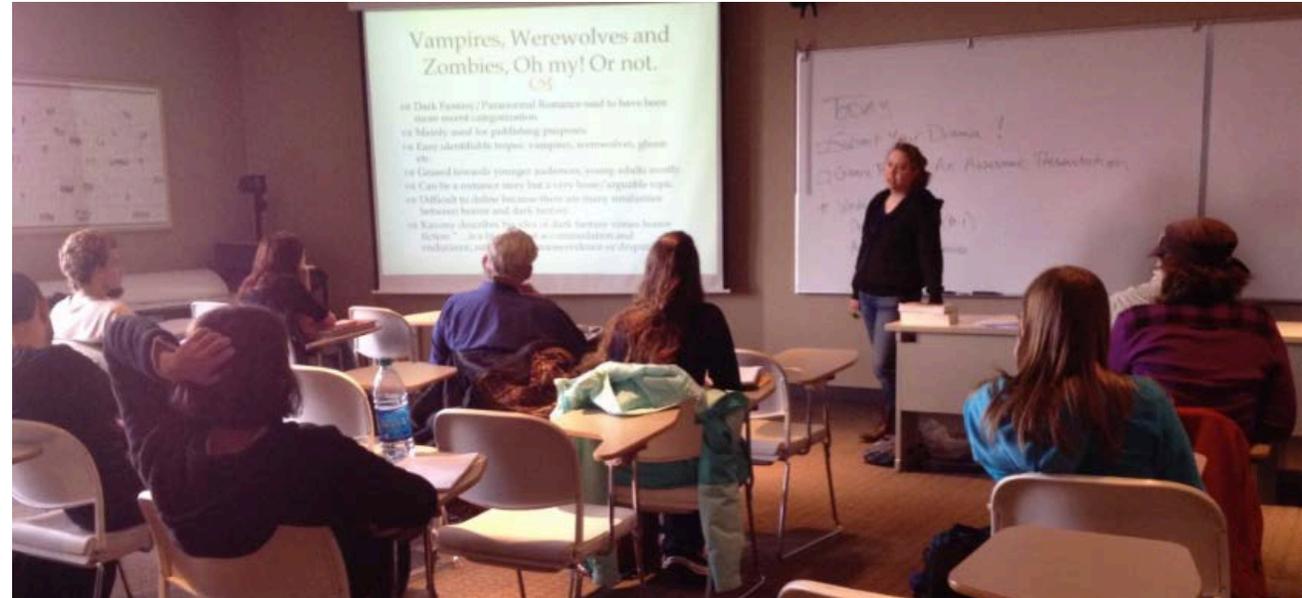


And some connections are more difficult



For less tangible connections...

...we can bring our students (back) into the classroom.



Internships can

- Clarify a student's career path
- Equalize opportunity across socioeconomic levels
- Apply a context for application and critical thinking
- Teach students “soft skills”
- Build professional relationships for students *and* for MCC
- Help students transition from college to career

(Divine et al., 2007)

And *teaching* internships can

- Change students' perspectives on learning
- Create opportunities for peer mentorship and modeling
- Has been shown to have “solidified career decisions based on a second exposure to the content” (pp. 114)
- Give students more agency in their education
